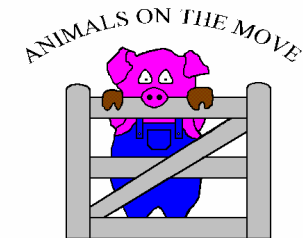

HOUSING

Animals on the Move, house our rabbits in enclosures that enable them to have a good hop around. They are fed mainly on dry feed, hay and carrots, so any change in diet should be done gradually to avoid illness.

We have different types of recommended hutches available for sale. From single story to double deluxe, or portable on wheels.

We have found that wood shavings or sawdust is the best form of bedding. With some hay or straw for extra warmth and food. (make sure the wood shavings are not toxic).

Rabbits will use the same place in their house for the toilet for most of their strong smelling urine. Place a sawdust filled litter tray in this corner, cleaning this on a regular daily basis will save on cleaning the whole hutch.



DIET

Rabbits are herbivores and require a varied, balanced diet. They have a specialized digestive tract that allows them to digest the large amount of fiber. Depending on the age you may feed ad lib if under 12 month age.

Older ones may need restrictions.

Don't be alarmed if you see your rabbit eating its own droppings! This is called coprophagy and is normal behavior, being necessary for a rabbit's health.

Essential Rabbits should never run out of water, they drink a lot so the ball bearing type drinkers are the best. (bowls will spill)

Hard feed Pasture replacement pellets for rabbits and even mixed with 50/50 Thurra horse feed is fine, should be available daily.

Sweet meadow Hay/ Lucerne or clover Should be made available at least twice a week.

Vegetables & green feed fresh carrots and tops Cauliflower & Broccoli stalk, Milk weed or some grass are enjoyed as treats a few times a week. **Avoid** feeding some greens as they may cause diarrhoea and distended stomachs, **things such as** raw beans, corn, rhubarb, and potato peels. Feed succulent vegetables such as lettuce and tomatoes in moderation. Lettuce can cause bloat and death.
