News from the barn is that it is full of baby animals, Chickens, Rabbits, Ducks, Geese, Piglets, Calves, Goat kids and lambs.


These are just a few of the babies that you will see over the next few months when AOTM visits you.

Pigs play a big part in our farm display. Some people do not like them but I am here to tell you that PIGS are fun.

Did you know that pigs have a great sense of smell, and that they are actually really clean animals.

You may ask why they wallow in mud? the answer to this is. Pigs do not have any sweat glands, they cover themselves in mud to help keep them cool and it prevents some insects from biting them.

PIGS are very intelligent and you can train pigs sometimes easier than training some dogs.

A group of Pigs is called a herd.

Pigs eat almost anything you give them and love to snort and dig with their snout (nose).



They can have big litters of babies, (up to 12 at a time). Mother pig gives her babies milk to drink.

A Male pig is called a BOAR

A Female pig is called a SOW

A Baby is called a PIGLET.

Ferrets As Pets

For many of us Ferrets may not be our ideal pet, but to those who have owned one already know they are excellent companions, easy to keep and lots of fun. If you are looking for an alternative pet why not try the trusty ferret?

With an average lifespan of five to eight yrs. Handled from a young age ferrets can become extremely tame and only occasionally nip. They may be taught to walk on a harness and lead, and even play games in pipes.

Ferrets are carnivores (meat eaters) and require up to 35 per cent protein and 20 per cent fat in their diet.

Good quality Kitten dry food can be a suitable diet. They appear to do well from this with the addition of the occasional raw chicken wing or neck.

An yearly vaccination against distemper is required. Heartworm treatment should also be considered. Speak to your veterinarian for further advice on health issues.

Interestingly the human flu can also be transmitted to your pet ferret and they too can pass it back to you.

The de sexing of a female ferret can be done from four or five months of age. They should either be de sexed or allowed to breed by this age or risk a continuous breeding season and can die from permanent bone marrow suppression, due to anemia.

Good luck if you decide to become a Ferret Owner.



CARING FOR OUR WILDLIFE

Animals On The Move C/- P.O. Box Gembrook Victoria 3783 It is sad many native animals are injured on our roads, some unfortunately are killed but some can be saved. With the assistance of the wildlife shelter's run by volunteers in your area, those who can be saved are treated with loving care and years of experience until their anticipated release back to the wild. In conjunction with

Heilsville sanctuary we all work closely together to save as many animals as we can.

If you find an injured animal or bird you can take them into your nearest veterinary clinic,

the best will be done for the animal, this is NO COST to you. Volunteers work tirelessly to save these little guys where ever possible, so please observe the following emergency tips to try to help out.

Some emergency first aid tips . Warmth is of the utmost importance, hot water bottle wrapped in a blanket & in a box will be fine. Quiet (after all the creature is wild and not used to humans). Place in a dark, quiet and warm room. If late at night then keep while the morning, unfortunately some animals due to shock will not make it through the first night.

If you see a baby bird you think is injured, observe first from a distance as the parents are often teaching them to fly and if you intervene the parent may not come back. Many are unnecessarily removed and have to be hand reared. Sometimes the parents were looking on when the young were taken.

And lastly make a note of where you found the wildlife as many species are very territorial and it will be necessary to release them back to the same place they were found.
